



at Akron University on January 26th. The students will now move to the State DECA Competition held on March 9th and 10th in Columbus, Ohio.



Final Fire Settlement Reached

On January 30, 2018, the members of the Willoughby-Eastlake Board of Education voted unanimously to accept the final settlement offer of \$8,711,086.93 for the fire occurring on March 14, 2017, destroying the board office. The original suggested offer was made to the district in June of 2017 in the amount of \$5,018,899.99.

After the initial offer was made, the district procured the assistance of the Alex N. Sill Company in order to make an attempt to maximize a settlement. After months of arduous investigation and negotiations, Willoughby-Eastlake was able to see a net gain of \$3,692,186.94.

The district recently purchased a building located at 35353 Curtis Boulevard in Eastlake, Ohio to replace the offices.

"Because the district opted to obtain a "walk away check" rather than rebuild the structure, we have been able to purchase an existing space and will plan to renovate that space. This type of strategy will allow us to replace necessary office space and complete renovations with insurance proceeds. Once the building is completed, excess proceeds will be used

specifically for improvements to our remaining buildings," stated Treasurer, Bill Parkinson. "This settlement option will further stretch the dollars spent by the district.

I consider this to be responsible spending of district funds."

Adopt-A-Family

The Student Council at Eastlake Middle School hosted Adopt - A - Family in order to bring Christmas cheer to area families.

During the drive, students in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades, from Eastlake Middle School, approached members of their families and members of the community in order to raise money for the event. As a result of their efforts, the students were able to raise \$3,600.00.

After completing their fundraising, sixteen students completed the job of shopping for families in the community, consisting of

six children and four adults.

"It is an honor to work with the students in Student Council and with the entire student body at Eastlake Middle School," stated Student Council Advisor, Britni Jenkins. "Our students have a true sense of compassion and generosity. During a four week span, they raised a total of \$7,100.00 for the needs of others. 


Biodiversity Bonanza: Lake Metroparks

In an effort to maximize learning and increase student engagement, the staff at Eastlake Middle School recently partnered with Lake Metroparks to bring the Biodiversity Bonanza to the school. This lesson has been designed by the Lake Metroparks to create a connection between science, technology, engineering and math to the English Language Arts standards.

During the program, students were able to participate in real-world experiences while learning about the numerous distinct environments in Ohio that support different kinds of organisms and their role within the environment.

School of Innovation

Euclid Creek Watershed Rehab



The students at the School of Innovation are working to enhance a natural habitat as a resource for outdoor environmental science studies.

The Euclid Creek Watershed drains

24 square miles from 11 Northeast Ohio Communities in Cuyahoga and Lake Counties, which includes approximately 1.43 square miles of land located at the western edge of Route 271 (behind the School of Innovation) and extending almost 500 linear feet downstream. While studying the land behind the school, the students found areas of bank erosion, channel incision, invasive species, undersized culverts and the absence of a functioning riparian floodplain.

In 2015, the Habitat Restoration Project Planning grant from the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (Ohio EPA) was

awarded to assist with the habitat restoration. That money, combined with funds donated by local municipalities, will enable the students to address existing issues. The students, while collaborating with advisors from First Energy, Bowen & Associates, Lake County Soil & Water Conservation District, NEORSD, Lake County Stormwater Management Department, Friends of Euclid Creek and the Cuyahoga Soil & Water Conservation District propose to

restore and stabilize the two creeks which will result in improvements in the stream. floodplain and riparian habitat.

Salvation Army angel tree, held food drives, assisted to clean area parks, volunteered with the Farmpark Haunted Hayride and helped with United Way fundraising.


The work done by the members of the Key Club has had a tremendous impact in the community.

The district is continuing to work with the YMCA to finalize materials and plans for the swimming pool.


At Longfellow Elementary, the foundations and the footers are underway and the building materials for the site are beginning to arrive


At North High, the storm line tie ins at Glen Drive are complete. The district is currently investigating additional park-


