Distinguished Citizens






Orchestra

With the return of fifteen juniors next year Coach Winters is looking forward to a successful season in 1956.



place. And win they did, beating both Brush and Maple and putting themselves in a three-way tie for first place.


They then won the remainder of their conference games and this, coupled with Brush's loss to Garfield, put them in a first place tie with Maple.


Doug Pringle received an injury in the fourth game of the season and was sidelined for most of the remainder of the season but was a great help to the Rangers.

record of 9-6.







Of the regulars, both Butch Lauderback and George Korpi had over a 300 batting average with 352 and 333 respectively.


