The purpose of Empty Bowls is to raise awareness of world hunger. Sixteen local restaurants have joined the students to supply soup for the event, including our own Willoughby-Eastlake district Chef and The Orlando Bread Company. All of these establishments are committed to making this function a success and to helping our community. Last year in 2017, this benefit raised over \$2,600



for the local food banks. Those attending will be charged an admission fee of \$10.00 which will be donated to local food banks. Guests will be given their bowl as a reminder of the event and the issue of food insecurity in the world.

On May 8, 2018, Willoughby-Eastlake will be on the ballot. Issue 2 is the renewal of an **emergency operating levy** that was originally passed in 2003, renewed in 2008 and again in 2013. As an emergency operating levy, the district is required to renew this levy every five years in order to keep our funding the same. Passage of this issue will **NOT** increase your taxes and will allow the district to continue the current programming, staffing and services offered to our students.

The revenue generated by this levy represents approximately 6.6% of the district's revenue budget and is critical to its financial well-being.

"Without these finances, the district would have to make significant cuts.

Mobile Fab Lab Update



Willoughby-Eastlake's NEW Mobile FAB Lab school visits are well underway. The lab has been housed inside two of our schools while necessary modifications were made to the trailer that will ultimately carry the FAB Lab equipment. Thank you to Grant Elementary and Eastlake Middle School for being the first schools to welcome the new lab. Our accomplishments include training over 15 teachers between the two schools, doing an introductory project with both 5th and 8th graders, and providing the opportunity for grades K-4 to tour the lab and see the machines in action! Thomas Jefferson Elementary staff and students were able to visit the lab while it was at Eastlake Middle School.

The next chapter begins, as we are loading up the improved trailer and heading to Willowick Middle School for a two week stay. Each of the remaining elementaries and middle schools will have the Mobile FAB Lab visit their school before the school year ends. The students that have already used the Mobile Fab Lab say that it has been very exciting and that they have had experiences that they never thought they would have in school!



With a swoop of their hand, students can change the land and observe changes in the land, water and contour lines in real time.



STUDENT SAFETY

WHAT HAS WILLOUGHBY-EASTLAKE DONE?

The concept of student safety has seen dramatic changes in the school district as we have moved from the parents and grandparents of the current students to today. Many Willoughby-Eastlake alumni still living in the community recall bringing their guns to school, along with the ammunition for the after-school gun club. Today, on any school campus in the nation, the thought of a person entering a school with a weapon is horrifying.

What has the school district done?

Door buzzers. Locks on all classroom doors. Security cameras.

These are only a few of the changes made by Willoughby-Eastlake City Schools to address the growing need for change in security. While not foolproof, these measures add a layer of control to who can access the building. As a result of Columbine, districts across the country learned that the first line of protection that should be modified was the entrance to all school buildings. Willoughby-Eastlake added bullpens, which require a person to be buzzed through two sets of doors in many of its school buildings. Once a visitor has entered the building, a security check is completed by running their driver's license through the **Raptor Visitor Management System**. This system identifies persons that may pose a viable threat to students and allows district personnel to stop them from entering the building.



The Ohio Department of Higher Education recommends that schools “prevent, prepare, respond and recover” in order to improve safety and security measures. In keeping with this suggestion, Willoughby-Eastlake has collaborated with Homeland Security and local law enforcement agencies to update all emergency operating plans annually, conduct safety drills (including fire, tornado and ALICE), provide and review ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter and Evacuate) training with all students and hired student resource officers to work in the district high schools and middle schools. In the

event of an actual emergency, Willoughby-Eastlake has also added MARCs (Multi-Agency Radio Communication System Radios) to the buildings and NaviGate Prepared safety software to improve the ability to communicate with law enforcement agencies.



What can you do?

Safety in school is a collaborative effort between parents, members of the community, students and district employees. It is critical to maintain an open line of communication when children have questions or concerns about their safety and that of others. If your child has a question it is important to answer their questions. Please encourage your child to follow the district mantra, “If you see something or hear something, say something.” Please ask your children to report when they hear rumors but also remind them of the importance of being truthful when reporting.

The district will take all reports seriously and will investigate all reports given to them. Once reports are investigated and it becomes possible to share information with families, it will do so immediately.

“School should be a safe place for students to grow and learn. I can assure you that Willoughby-Eastlake will take all measures to keep students safe when they enter our buildings each day. I would encourage you to talk to your children and discuss the safety measures that they have been taught. Sometimes, reminding your child of something as simple as, don’t open the school doors to people when they knock, could make the difference between their safety and lack thereof,” Steve Thompson, Willoughby-Eastlake Superintendent. “In the event of an emergency or even a threat to student safety, please understand that our district will follow established procedures, investigate the concern and inform our families as soon as possible.”

EMERGENCY COMMUNICATION TIMELINE

- Complete intake of report (sometimes numerous) - If report is given by local law enforcement agencies, assist to identify source of threat
- Verify all facts with individual(s) reporting incident - if students are in session, determine impact on student safety/act accordingly and monitor students through all steps
- Notify law enforcement agencies and district crisis team members
- Monitor additional incoming reports and continue to ensure that law enforcement agencies have new information - live time
- Respond to all law enforcement agents and identify contact information so that police can interview/investigate pertinent parties
- Collaborate with law enforcement to determine timeline for informing community/parents (If immediate threat to students, police may need to investigate first, information to the public may jepordize police investigations and locating source of threat)
- Allow law enforcement agencies to investigate and assist as requested
- Determine appropriate information to be released based on police recommendations
- Create parent and community messages/review threats to students and student safety (If safety is in question, send students home as soon as possible. If the school day has not started, school is cancelled.)
 - Notify parents/community details of emergency
 - Continue to evaluate threat/assist police with questions/answer community questions



Project Updates

Longfellow Elementary School saw its first steel beam going up this week and the steel will continue to go into place in the weeks to come. The first area to receive steel is the future home of kindergarten classrooms and first grade classrooms. In addition to this exciting advancement, the electricians have been on site working with the masons to establish areas for electrical boxes and the plumbers are completing "rough ins." The North and East walls of the gym area are completed and the veneer is being placed over those surfaces. Before leaving for Spring break, the students from Longfellow were able to sign one of the beams that will be used in the school. The progress at Longfellow has been significant and is very exciting.
